Affordable Housing Contribution	A contribution from a landowner (developer) of land, cash, and/or dwellings, negotiated through the planning system. Charter	A charter represents a document that describes a project, its rationale, its goals and its participants. The purpose of a charter aims at aligning the expectations of all the contributors so that their energy focuses on the project's priorities. The Regional Local Government Homelessness and Social Housing Charter is a formal agreement that has been adopted by thirteen Councils in the south and east of Melbourne.	<u>bizfluent</u>
Charter Group	The group of Councils that have adopted the Regional Local Government Homelessness and Social Housing Charter. Participating Councils include Bayside, Cardinia, Casey, Greater Dandenong, Frankston, Kingston, Knox, Manningham, Maroondah, Monash, Mornington Peninsula, Yarra Ranges and Whitehorse.

Community Housing	Affordable housing managed by a registered housing agency.

Crisis and emergency Accommodation	Crisis and emergency accommodation includes a range of specialist services for people who are homeless, at risk of homelessness, escaping family violence, or in other emergency situations. It includes women's refuges, youth refuges and major crisis supported accommodation services. It does not include rooming houses.	Adapted from AHURI
Homelessness	<ul> <li>When a person does not have suitable accommodation alternatives they are considered homeless if their current living arrangement: <ul> <li>is in a dwelling that is inadequate; or</li> <li>has no tenure, or if their initial tenure is short and not extendable; or</li> <li>does not allow them to have control of, and access to space for social relations.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	ABS brief definition
Homelessness Service System	A system that supplements the mainstream welfare system primarily through Specialist Homelessness Services (SHS) providing direct assistance and support to people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness. It also includes programs operated by health, community support, emergency relief, legal or faith organisations that are targeted at this group of people.	
Housing Affordability	The relationship between the cost of housing (mortgage or rental payments) and household income.	Hornsby & Co. Housing Continuum	The 'housing continuum' is a concept used by policy makers to consider the broad range of responses available to help a range of households in different tenures to access affordable and appropriate housing. The concept enables policy makers to move away from a one-size-fits-all strategy of providing public housing, towards 'the range of housing options available to different households on a continuum.' Housing Stress	Housing stress occurs when households have to pay too large a proportion of their income in housing costs (reducing their capacity to pay for other essentials such as food and health), and as a result, housing costs rise too far above household incomes. Human Rights	<ul> <li>People experiencing homelessness face violations of a wide range of human rights. Access to safe and secure housing is one of the most basic human rights. However, homelessness is not just about housing.</li> <li>A person who is homeless may be facing violations of the right to an adequate standard of living, the right to education, the right to liberty and security of the person, the right to privacy, the right to social security, the right to freedom from discrimination, the right to vote and many more.</li> <li>These human rights are protected by a number of international human rights treaties, including the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR), the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights (ICESCR), and the Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC).</li> </ul>	Australian Human Rights Commission The Parliament of Victoria Legislative Council Legal and Social Issues Committee's Inquiry into Homelessness in Victoria Final Report March 2021 has recommended: "That the Victorian Government include the right to housing in the Victorian Charter of Human Rights and Responsibilities Act 2006 (Vic)."

Mandatory Inclusionary zoning	A land use planning intervention by government that mandates a proportion of a residential development includes a number of affordable housing dwellings.	Adapted from AHURI

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Rooming House	A rooming house is a building where one or more rooms are available for rent, and residents share facilities like kitchens or bathrooms. A resident does not need to have a tenancy agreement to live in a rooming house. In Victoria, there is a Rooming House Register and a licensing scheme for Rooming House Operators.	
Section 173 agreement	Under the Planning and Environment Act 1987, a legally binding agreement between council and a landowner. The agreement remains with the land, regardless of change of ownership. Specialist Disability Accommodation (SDA)	A market-based system that has been created under the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) to provide housing for people with very high support needs. SDA payments are made by the National Disability Insurance Agency to a person with SDA funding allocated in their NDIS plan. The funding is used to cover the cost of capital to build specialised housing.	Hornsby & Co. Specialist Homelessness Services (SHS)	SHS refers to agencies that are jointly funded by the State and Federal Governments under the National Housing and Homelessness Agreement to provide support to people who are experiencing or at risk of homelessness. They include agencies that provide a general service as well agencies that work with a specific target group such as young people. SHS agencies are full members of either the <u>Southern Homelessness Services Network</u> or the <u>Eastern Homelessness Network</u> .	
Social housing	Means: (a) public housing; and (b) housing owned, controlled or managed by a participating registered agency. <i>(this is commonly</i> <i>known as community housing)</i>	Adapted from <i>Housing Act 1983</i> , Section 4 Definitions
Supported housing	A type of housing that provides higher-level care and support for people with particular needs.	Hornsby & Co. Transitional housing	A supported short-term accommodation program designed to help people move to more permanent housing in public housing, community housing, or the private rental market.
