The long campaign by Monash youth and Council to see a headspace youth mental health service in Monash has been won with support from both political parties for this critical facility.

The Federal Government announcement that it will fund a headspace in Monash follows a commitment from the Federal Labor Opposition in October last year.

It's a huge win for the young people of Monash, who have campaigned long and hard for this important service to support the mental wellbeing of young people up to the age of 25.

The news was greeted with delight by the Monash Young Person's Reference **Group and Council.**

The campaign had included a gathering of more than

4,000 postcards signed by the community in support of a headspace and a number of meetings over the past few years between Mayors, young people and Federal politicians, including a trip to Canberra to meet with the ministerial advisor for Minister for Health Greg Hunt.

Last year the advocacy included the 'Raise Your Hand 4 Monash Youth' campaign featuring a powerful video of young people speaking about the effect of mental health issues on the youth of Monash.

Having greater access to help for issues relating to youth mental health, like a headspace service, will make an enormous difference in the lives of young people in Monash, assisting them to live happier and healthier lives and reach their full potential.

Former Mayors Rebecca Paterson and Paul Klisaris, and current Mayor Shane McCluskey and a dedicated team of officers across Council have advocated for more than five years to get the funding for this centre.

TIRELESS CHAMPION for the community

An unwavering dedication to improve the quality of life of older residents saw Ms Zhang Hu awarded the Positive Ageing Leadership Award at the 2018 Sir John Monash Awards.

Ms Hu established the community group Zhangzhou Senior Club of Victoria in 2010 in Mount Waverley to provide a service for elderly people to improve their quality of life and reduce social isolation.

She coordinates a support group of volunteers to help in the group activities, such as organising transport, interpreter services, financial support and tailored activities, including home visits to seniors who are unwell.

Another initiative by Ms Hu was the development of a successful three-year VCE program with Monash University, based on a one-to-one learning approach to help VCE



students improve their learning of Chinese as a second language.

Her commitment to help her community has remained strong, even while caring for her husband who had a significant health issue.

High Commendations were given to John Jarvis who has been an outstanding volunteer for South East Volunteers and Liming Cao, who founded the Clayton Mandarin Friendship Association.

Council is upgrading several playspaces in Monash to make them more interesting and fun for local children.

We are updating playspaces in Evelyn Street (Clayton) and Electra Avenue (Ashwood) based on community feedback. Electra Avenue will include a multiplay unit, a flying fox, basketball key and fitness equipment. Valuable shade trees will be retained. At Evelyn Street, an ant-shaped adventure play unit will create much fun for children. We hope to complete these projects in 2019/20.

We are also asking for the community's ideas on upgrades to playspaces in Danien Street (Glen Waverley), Wilma Avenue (Mulgrave) and Madison Court (Mount Waverley).

Anticipation is building about the \$23.3 million redevelopment of Oakleigh Recreation Centre – the biggest project undertaken by Monash Council in more than 20 years.

The project will see the transformation of the existing centre into an outstanding integrated multi-purpose sports precinct, featuring five new indoor basketball courts, a gymnasium upgrade and conversion of the existing stadium to a regional level gymnastics facility for the Waverley Gymnastics Club.

The new ORC will deliver top-class facilities for the community and meet the growth of participation in sport amongst our local community, particularly females.

The new home of Waverley
Gymnastics Club will allow hundreds

of children who are on the club's waiting list to join classes.

Council is contributing \$17.2M to the project, the Federal Government \$2.1M and the State Government \$3M through Sports Recreation Victoria.

Waverley Gymnastics is funding \$1M and will move from Dorrington Drive, Mount Waverley to the Oakleigh Recreation Centre at the completion of the project.

The redesign of the facility has been a complex project due to the challenges and constraints of the site, delaying the start of the project. All works will now be completed in one stage so the project can be completed as quickly and efficiently as possible.

The gym and stadium will close for the duration of works. The outdoor

pool area is unaffected and will continue as a seasonal facility.

Teams who have competed in stadium competitions have been advised that these competitions will no longer be offered or managed by Monash Council at the end of the current season. Instead, Waverley Basketball Association, Waverley District Netball Association and Volleyball Victoria will be managing competitions in the stadium when it re-opens in late 2020.

The Oakleigh outdoor pool will be open during the 2019/20 summer period. The project is expected to be completed in October 2020.

WARM WELCOME FOR Meet Your Street project

The 'Meet Your Street' project is underway. The project aims to foster stronger connections between residents within local Monash neighbourhoods and to positively impact residents' perceptions of their own safety (personal and property), the safety of their neighbourhood and their safety within Monash.

We've determined the four precincts in the suburbs of Ashwood/ Chadstone, Wheelers Hill, Glen Waverley and Clayton where the project will start and have surveyed the neighbourhoods. We have also delivered the distinctive 'Meet Your Street' postcards and letters and have begun visiting households in these local neighbourhoods.

The visits are about sharing what the project is about, finding out about local social connections and encouraging people to talk, engage and meet their local community.

Next steps are to help the community plan and take part in fun activities and get to know each other.

There will be support from Council to help with activities, whether it be a street party, neighbourhood



gathering or community activity to improve neighbourhood connections.

Council will evaluate the project to gauge its success through surveys and neighbourhood feedback.

...know what the regulations are for blackberry bushes?

Did you know blackberries are a noxious weed, considered one of the worst weeds in Australia because of its invasiveness and destruction of other plants?

If you see a blackberry bush in Monash, please report it to Council. If it's on public land, we will remove it. If on private land, we give the property owner four weeks to poison it or dig it out.

As the blackberry is a 'mirror' plant, whatever is growing and can be seen above ground is matched by what is underneath. In some cases, it may take more than four weeks to remove the plant. Council will work with property owners to assist with removal in these cases.

Council has been officially endorsed as a Child and Young People Friendly City (CYPFC) by the Victorian Local Governance Association.



A year ago, Council began working towards becoming recognised as a CYPFC by actively encouraging and supporting engagement with children and young people and developing strategies to ensure that we interact with children as active citizens of Monash and that they have a voice across Council.

Some of the activities undertaken with young people include the Junior Advisory Group, made up of Grade 4 children from schools across Monash, who send in questions for Councillors and then come and ask those questions of our Councillors.

We are also producing a dedicated newsletter for young people, written by a committee made up of children and young people.

We have had great feedback from those children who have had access to the newsletter and we are already planning the next edition.

Becoming a CYPFC is a key focus of Council's 2017–2021, A Healthy & Resilient Monash: Integrated Plan.

Councillor News Cr Rebecca Paterson

People often ask me what it is like to be a Councillor, and whether it is more difficult because I am a woman, a mother or because of my age. It's a good question, but demonstrates to me that we still grapple with how women and younger people manage leadership.

That's why I was so excited in 2016 when Monash Youth Services developed and introduced the Young Women's Leadership Program for women between 15-20 years. Since 2016, 80 young women have completed the program, gaining the skills and confidence to be leaders in their own community whether it's by becoming School Captain, gaining part-time employment or successfully applying for university scholarships. One graduate trekked Mount Kilimanjaro to raise awareness of violence against women.

In March, I hosted Monash Council's annual International Women's Day event at the stunning Monash Gallery of Art, with guest speaker Jamila Rizvi talking to the packed room about women and luck. Jamila facilitated a fascinating discussion with six graduates of our Leadership Program highlighting the world through their eyes.

After this discussion, I was privileged to announce that Monash Council has VicHealth funding to take the Young Women's Leadership Program across Victoria. It's clear this expansion is going to result in great outcomes for the wider community.

In Mt Waverley, and across Monash, residents continue to worry about tree removals on development sites. This has been one of the big issues that I have been trying to progress over the last six years. Though it has been far slower than I would have liked, Council approved the Monash Urban Landscape and Canopy Vegetation Strategy in October 2018. This commits Council to increasing tree coverage from the current 22% to 30% by 2030.

Council has a lot of work to do to meet this target and will consider this year precisely how to do it. We may consider changes to overlays on properties. The changes we undertake to meet this target will affect many residents, so I encourage you to check the Bulletin for information about this later in the year. We will consult with you on any changes, and your feedback will be an important part of any decision we make so please tell us your thoughts about our plans to meet the target of 30% tree coverage across our city.

CHECKMATE for the Clayton Clarinda Leadership Group

The Clayton Clarinda Leadership Group recently applied for a Neighbourhood Matching Grant. The grant was to encourage local residents and users of the Clayton Community Centre to learn and play chess. With Council support they approached the Monash Men's Shed who created two handmade chess boards and chess pieces.

One of the boards will be held at the Clayton Library with the two sets of chess pieces. The other board will be fixed to a table at the Clayton Road Plaza. The model will be very much like the ping pong table at Glen Waverley, with the chess board and pieces available for loan on presentation of a library card or photo ID.

To launch the initiative the Clayton Leadership Group held a chess tournament at the Clayton Festival. The group invited along a chess master who played multiple games against a variety of players, young and old, throughout the day. There was also a large chess set which also attracted many players during the festival. The group were overwhelmed with the success of the venture and are already planning to run the event again at next year's festival.

The campaign underlines a belief that Australians support each other during hard times and the taskforce is advocating for the Federal Government to do the same.

Monash Open Gardens Day is run by the Waverley Garden Club, is supported by Monash Council and will be held on Saturday 9 November.


