THE YEAR ahead

\$64M capital works improvements

In the coming year, Council will embark on one of its biggest capital works programs ever, allocating \$64M on significant upgrades to community facilities and core services.

The \$24.4M redevelopment of the Oakleigh Recreation Centre is a highlight of the 2019/20 Budget with the facility to be transformed into an integrated multi-purpose sports precinct, featuring five new indoor basketball courts, a gymnasium upgrade and conversion of the existing stadium to a regional level gymnastics facility for the Waverley Gymnastics Club. This is a joint project funded by the Federal and State Governments, Council and Waverley Gymnastics Club. Another highlight is the introduction in July 2020 of a food waste recycling service that will support our residents in their desire for more sustainable waste practices at home.

The introduction of the food waste recycling means that residents can dispose of food scraps in their regular green waste bin for composting.

We will also be focusing on upgrades to drainage, footpaths, roads and playspaces as we know from feedback provided to us that these are important to our community.

Monash has secured its household recycling collection until 31 March 2020 but China's ban on some recycling materials resulted in an unexpected net cost to Council of \$1.5M per year.

Council had to make the decision to introduce in 2018/19 a limited recycling levy of \$22 per ratepayer to meet these increased costs. This limited levy will continue in 2019/20 at \$22 per rateable property to recover the costs of the recycling crisis and pensioners will continue to receive a rebate for the full amount of the recycling levy.

Other Budget highlights include:

- » \$900,000 upgrade for playspaces at Evelyn Street Reserve (Clayton), Electra Reserve (Ashwood), Melissa Street (Mount Waverley) and an accessible explorer trail and sensory path at Wellesley Road (Glen Waverley)
- » Carry forward of \$350,000 budget for design and construction commencement of the Brentwood Reserve **Pavilion**
- » Commencement of the Princes Highway Reserve West Sportsground Redevelopment, Oakleigh East (\$1.2M)
- » Completion of lighting upgrade works at Scammell Reserve, Oakleigh (\$260,000) and Mayfield Park Reserve, Mount Waverley (\$320,000)
- » The design and installation of a modular clubroom facility for Waverley Archers at Freeway Reserve, Mulgrave.

DEVELOPMENT PLANS for former Oakleigh South School site

A proposed development plan for the former Oakleigh South Primary School site has been lodged with Council and we are seeking the community's views on the plans.

It outlines a medium density townhouse development of 89 dwellings ranging in height from 2-3 storeys at 1 Beryl Avenue (52 Golf Road) Oakleigh South. Feedback is formally sought by Wednesday 24 July 2019 however Council will continue to accept submissions on this proposal up until it makes a decision.

The proposed plan includes:

- » 16 two-bedroom townhouses
- » 18 three-bedroom townhouses
- » 55 four-bedroom townhouses
- » Retention of 7 trees
- » Removal of 48 trees
- » Central communal open space area located in the centre of the site where two existing mature trees will be retained
- » Vehicle access via Golf Road
- » Predominantly double storey dwellings with some three storey dwellings located in the middle of the site and along the north-eastern boundary (adjacent to the golf club).

In 2014, the former State
Government rezoned
the site to Residential
and placed a
Development Plan
Overlay on the site.
The Development

Plan Overlay reduced the rights of residents to object to development on the site.

The site has had several development proposals from its original owner Oakleigh Garden Pty Ltd with Council refusing the original plan for the site in 2015. In August 2016 Council also refused an amended development proposal. Oakleigh Garden Pty Ltd then sold the land to aged care provider Bupa in August 2016. In December 2018 Golf Road Project Development Pty Ltd bought the land and have submitted this proposal.

How to provide feedback:

Any person who may be affected by the proposal may lodge an objection or provide feedback to Council. Objections must be made in writing.

Objections should detail any concerns you have, reasons for the objection, how you would be affected by the proposal and include your name, postal address and quote this reference number TP440.

MESSAGE FROM

Mayor Shane McCluskey

A number of significant consultations are to begin over the next few months and I encourage you all to have your say.

At the recent June Council meeting we considered new planning provisions for tree and vegetation removal that will sit under the Monash Urban and Landscape Vegetation Strategy that was adopted by Council in October 2018.

These planning provisions outline how we will treat tree removals in the future on private property. They remove the existing Vegetation Protection Overlay which only applied to some areas and introduce a Significant Landscape Overlay across all of Monash to require a planning permit for the removal of canopy trees. Tree removal is a challenge for many. There are always those who want trees removed and those who want them to stay. We've undertaken an enormous amount of work on this topic and are mindful of what the community has already told us through our community surveys and at our listening posts. The garden city character of Monash is highly valued and with these planning provisions, we are seeking to balance the need for development as the community grows whilst retaining those green characteristics so important to our residents. We have now gone to the Minister for Planning with our proposal, as required, and then will be consulting widely with you to get your feedback. Don't miss this opportunity to contribute.

We will soon be releasing the draft Clayton and Huntingdale Precinct Plans for feedback. These two precinct plans look to the future of these areas, outlining how to reinvigorate these two areas that are key centres for industry, technology and science. Clayton and Huntingdale have enormous potential and we are keen to hear what you think about what is proposed.

This month I attended a Community Leaders United by Sport (CLUBS) event to hear 10 champions of this Councilled program talk about how it has helped strengthen good culture and inclusiveness within sporting clubs. This program seeks to encourage more participation from girls and women in sport. It's fair to say the program has opened the eyes of some clubs as to what they need to do to provide sporting opportunities for everyone, regardless of gender and to their credit the clubs involved have embraced the knowledge and are keen to make changes.


This is a fantastic initiative run in partnership with Sport and

...report a water leak or burst pipe

If you see water flowing into the streets from a burst pipe or notice a water leak you can report it directly to the water company that services that location. In Monash the water supply is managed by Yarra Valley Water and South East Water. Yarra Valley Water services the areas north of Dandenong Road and South East Water, south of Dandenong Road - but whatever utility you contact, they will make sure you are connected to the correct provider when you tell them the location of the burst pipe or leak.

South East Water: 132 812 (24 hours)

PROTECTING trees and garden character

The garden city character and urban landscape of Monash is highly valued by our community, creating an attractive and welcoming place to live.

However, the high level of new development has seen tree cover and greenness decline across Monash.

We know through our community surveys this is an issue for residents and that's why Council adopted an Urban Landscape and Canopy Vegetation Strategy.

The Strategy covers both public and private land, and aims to improve and increase tree canopy and gardens across Monash. The Strategy also recognised that in most cases, trees are removed without appropriate replacement, leading to the loss of the garden character of our suburbs.

We've done further work on a new range of planning permit controls

to cover tree removals. At the June 2019 meeting Council resolved to ask the Minister for Planning for authorisation to prepare and consult on these controls, as is required under the Act.

The proposed new controls would mean a permit would generally be required to remove a tree that is 6 metres or taller. However, no permit would be required to remove a tree within 3 metres of an existing dwelling.

Once the Minister authorises the preparation of the changes Council will send information to all residents and property owners as part of an extensive consultation program on the proposed changes.

COUNCILLOR NEWS Cr Theo Zographos

I hope you have been staying warm during the last few chilly weeks. Since my last update much has been keeping Council busy. Some highlights include:

- » Caloola Reserve Oakleigh new tennis courts opened
- Upgrade work to Clayton Hall completed
- » New bike lane in Browns Road Clayton
- Pedestrian safety upgrades in Oakleigh activity centre
- Concept designs for Glen Waverley Montclair carpark.

However, it is obvious that our community is changing. Late last month Council approved a 10 storey building on the corner of Warrigal Road and Atherton Road (opposite Oakleigh Police station) which I supported. This comes after multiple similar structures built in Oakleigh in recent years. At last month's meeting, Council sought public feedback on two structure plans for Clayton and Huntingdale. So what is a structure plan? It is a planning provision that most activity centres encompass to determine how planning decisions are made. The Clayton one is quite large in scope incorporating many proposed different precincts. I encourage you to take a look.

I am aware of grievances regarding the removal of Oakleigh's boulevard trees along Atherton Road which is why I advocated strongly against their removal late last year. People have told me had they known before these trees were removed they would have done something about it or made their views known. That's why it's essential to be aware of Council's deliberations. Signing up to our newsletter or visiting my website TheoZographos.com are two ways you can do this.

It is very pleasing that from next year Council will start providing food waste as part of its green waste bins. You might have friends or relatives in Glen Eira who've been using a small caddy bin to dispose of organic waste since 2017. That could well be what we use as well although the exact model hasn't been finalised.

Council recently improved pedestrian safety in the Oakleigh CBD along Portman and Chester Streets and Eaton Mall. These works include the installation of raised zebra crossings and supporting concrete and paving works, drainage, line marking and lighting. The traffic lights now automatically move to a red light for cars so that pedestrians get immediate priority. As Molly would say, "do yourself a favour" and test it out next time you're there.

Finally, you may have seen Council is refunding traffic infringements dating back to 2006. If you are an eligible driver or registered vehicle owner and have not applied





PLAYSPACE FUN on its way

Exciting upgrades to playspaces in Clayton and Mount Waverley will get underway this month with further playspace improvements planned in the coming months.

The improvements to the Evelyn Street Reserve (Clayton) include a senior and junior ant-shaped adventure play unit, a rocker and play car, basket swing, face-to-face expression swing and play table and play panels.

Nature play has also been incorporated into the design. There will be a table and bench seating and improved landscaping with additional trees and garden beds.

At the Melissa Street playspace (Mount Waverley) children will enjoy a timber adventure play unit with a tunnel, a rock climbing wall, frog play sculpture and a swing set with a nest swing. There will also be a nature play area, junior play panels, a picnic table and bench seating and additional trees and garden beds planted.

We will also be upgrading the Electra Reserve playspace (Ashwood) in the coming months. This playspace will include a multi-play unit with senior and junior slides, swing, climbing fitness equipment, basketball key, with basket and face-to-face expression swing and nature play. There will be a picnic table and bench seating added, additional trees and garden beds planted to complement the significant Golden Elm and Chinese Elm Pin Oak shade trees.
