Satisfaction Survey

The annual Victorian Community Satisfaction
Survey results are out and Monash has recorded an excellent result for overall community satisfaction.

Council scored 73 for overall satisfaction, significantly higher than the 2019 metropolitan Melbourne average benchmark of 69.

High scores were also achieved for community satisfaction with governance and leadership, averaging a score of 73 for five key aspects:

- Maintaining trust and confidence of the local community (73)
- Community engagement and consultation (73)
- Making decisions in the interest of the community (72)
- Responsiveness to local community needs (72)
- Representation, lobbying and advocacy on behalf of community (72).

SPORTSGROUND investment


Council is investing in \$1.2m in improvements to the Princes **Highway Reserve West Oval.**

These works are an exciting project for the local sports clubs and park users, ensuring the ground remains usable and in good condition throughout the winter months. The works will significantly improve drainage and drought tolerance with the installation of the new turf surface and a highly efficient irrigation system.

The improvement works include:

- » removal of the existing turf surface
- » addition of a sand profile and re-levelling of the surface
- » new drainage and irrigation system
- » installation of new warm season grass
- » new coaches boxes and synthetic grass pads.

Works will begin in September 2019. The pitch upgrade and associated works are expected to take around four months to complete.



However, the upgrade will require the ground to be closed for up to 12 months while these improvement works take place and the grass established. The area will be fenced off until April 2020.

There will be no access to the west sportsground during this period and limited access to car parking. The Princes Highway Reserve East sportsground and surrounding areas will remain open as normal. The ground is expected to be available for formal sport usage from September 2020.

Community Satisfaction Survey (Cont.)

The results show that Council is performing very well in the key areas of libraries (85), waste management (84) and customer service (78).

These scores were given as part of the 2019 Community Satisfaction Survey, an annual face-to-face survey of 800 randomly selected Monash residents. The survey helps Council identify services that need to be improved and areas where we are not meeting the community's expectations.

The areas identified by residents surveyed as needing attention are car parking, traffic management, street lighting, street tree maintenance and urban planning.

We are keen to hear from residents who have concerns about lighting in their streets so we can send our team out to assess and resolve any issues.

The results also identified a decline in residents feeling connected to their neighbours. We are working on projects to increase connectedness between our residents and will share more on this project soon.

We will continue to work towards improving our services and reaching higher standards. Thank you to those who took part in the survey for your valuable feedback.

Council regularly engages with our community in a number of ways, including regular Listening Posts, consultation on specific items and issues, engagement at events and festivals, as well as face-to-face interviews as part of Community Satisfaction Survey. We are thrilled to rank equal highest (alongside two other Councils) of those who participated in this survey.

The early indicators from this year's Community Satisfaction Survey have shown that our community is very satisfied with some of the areas of core business such as waste, recycling and the quality of maintenance of parks and reserves. One of the issues the community thought needed addressing was in relation to lighting. You will see elsewhere in this edition an example of how you can assist Council in identifying areas of particular concern which may require increased or enhanced lighting quality. GREEN SHOOTS program enriching Monash

Monash has a rich bushland and leafy environment that is highly valued by our residents. Trees and green space provide clean air, cool our environment and retain water in the soil.

The Green Shoots Program helps residents connect with nature, improve and increase awareness of biodiversity and appreciate the value of trees. It delivers actions from Council's Urban Biodiversity Strategy.

The program was developed in response to a high level of interest from

residents keen to help protect, improve and experience the local natural environment. The program

includes the popular
Skink Link Project at
Scotchmans Creek
in Oakleigh which is
creating new habitats for
skinks. Our invitation to
the community to help
build the habitats has
been enthusiastically

embraced with residents keen to contribute through planting, picking up litter and weeding. Two Skink Link lounges have been constructed and local students have propagated seeds from a very old remnant Red Gum tree and planted them back in the creek environment. Interpretive signs have been installed from Warrigal Rd to Huntingdale Rd. Many are enjoying wandering along the creek, learning about the local environment and looking out for wildlife.

Since 2016, more than 100 residents have joined the Monash Gardens for Wildlife program. Workshops are run

> by our Bushland team and we provide free indigenous seedlings for gardens. Schools have joined in to increase the vegetation on their school grounds. These gardens are vital stepping stones for wildlife, creating corridors as they travel

between bushland and parks.

Our new volunteer Garden Guides will be visiting participants' gardens to provide individual support and advice on how to create a habitat garden. Council is also collaborating with the local residents of Glen Tower Drive to create a Garden for Wildlife in the road reserve for both people and wildlife to enjoy.

TENDERS awarded

One of the most important services Council provides is our kerbside collection of garbage, recycling and garden waste bins.

We've recently completed a tender for the bin collection service. Council has engaged Rico Enterprises Pty Ltd (trading as Solo Resource Recovery) to provide this service under a new seven year contract from April 2020.

The agreement includes: use of vehicles which meet EURO6 standards to reduce vehicle emissions; an education fund to support community education to improve service outcomes; delivery of a kitchen caddy to all Monash properties with an existing garden bin prior to the introduction of a

food waste in green bin service in July 2020; and bin collections and transportation to recycling and disposal facilities.

The contract will also include social and sustainability outcomes, including the employment of one full-time person from a socially or economically disadvantaged background.

The new three year contract will start on 1 October 2019. Council has also awarded the tender for its Meals on Wheels service to Lite n' Easy (Victoria) Pty Ltd to provide and

deliver up to 1,000 meals weekly to residents using this service.

Monash and Knox Councils have undertaken a collaborative tender for this service, saving on costs. The previous contractor to Council for this service, iCook Pty Ltd, was unable to provide meals towards the end of its contract in February 2019 and an alternative provider was required at short notice.

Lite n' Easy was engaged by Council to provide an interim service whilst a new tender was put in place.

All food is delivered by Council staff and volunteers to residents' homes.

Transfer Station works

We are replacing the fence at the Monash Transfer Station in Ferntree Gully Road (Notting Hill) during September.

The transfer station will remain open every day (7.30am-4pm) and traffic management will be in place to guide people around the site. The old western and northern perimeter fences will be removed and a new fence constructed in October. We anticipate there may be some delays for visitors but we will be working to minimise these as much as possible.

As part of this project Council will also be removing 20 trees that have been inspected by our arborist. While a number of the trees are being removed to accommodate the fence project, many are not in optimal condition.

When the new fence is in place, 28 new trees will be planted in the transfer station to replace trees removed. The species, Syzygium austral ST2, has been chosen for its screening and maintenance properties.

BETTER APPROVALS

here at Monash

Faster permits for local businesses are here following the introduction of the Better Approval Process, cutting business permit processing times.

The project was introduced following a Victorian Government small business review highlighting that one of the significant hurdles for business success was the cost of the time taken to secure the relevant permits. As a result local Councils have reviewed and streamlined their existing processes.

A new process has been designed to provide a single application form, as well as a supportive service to streamline the existing practices.

This new process is particularly helpful where more than one permit is required. For example, a new café may require planning, building, health and footpath trading permits. These are all managed through different teams and have varying legislation behind them. The new online single application form, and supporting in-house coordination provides time and cost savings to business operators.

These new services will be of particular advantage to businesses who have not previously managed such applications.

This is just another way that Council is supporting local business and the provision of local jobs.

COUNCILLOR NEWS Cr Stuart James

Investing in sporting facilities and park upgrades was one of my promises for this Council term. I am proud of the investments in a number of upgrades that have occurred in the Oakleigh Ward over the past few years. A brand new playground has been built in Samada Street, Notting Hill and we have upgraded the playground in Catherine Avenue, Mt Waverley. We have also just approved tenders for the redevelopment of playgrounds at Melissa Street and Evelyn Street, Clayton, with construction to commence shortly. The jewel in the crown, however, is the recently opened Galbally Reserve in Hughesdale where Council spent almost half a million dollars building an amazing new play area. The first ever expression swing set in Monash was part of the Samada



Street concept and we have included this amazing play piece at Galbally Reserve. If you haven't been down there to check it out, make sure you put it on your list. My daughters love playing on it (see left).

I was also incredibly pleased to see two big ticket items approved in this year's budget including \$1.2m for the redevelopment of Princes Highway Reserve West (Oakleigh East). If I'm to be honest, the ground is an embarrassment and in desperate need of this work. Along with recently installed lights and a relatively new pavilion, this will be the final piece of the puzzle. Down the

road at Scammell Reserve, Council approved my budget bid for funding to upgrade the lights at the ground to go with the amazing \$2.4m pavilion that was opened last year. These two sporting grounds will be areas that residents can be very proud of and the envy of many.

In November 2017, I updated you on another key commitment I made to assist parents dealing with social isolation issues following the birth of their children. After many discussions with officers, the Cabena Street Playgroup emerged as an informal drop-in centre for parents, grandparents, carers and children to socialise and share their experiences. The success of this playgroup has been astronomical, with more than 400 families visiting each week. Late last year, Council approved a motion to open a second centre in Glen Waverley and it has quickly become just as popular. We are also running specialist programs at the centres to help parents with a variety of issues such as anxiety, mental health concerns and the challenges of being a single parent. It is undoubtedly the initiative of which I am most proud to have championed. If you are a carer or have young children, or grandchildren, I urge you to take the time to visit the centres.

WORK PROGRESSING on Oakleigh Rec Centre

Demolition works on the interior of the Oakleigh Recreation Centre are well underway as the \$24.4M redevelopment progresses.

The works so far have included the removal of the former Oakleigh Tennis Club facility and courts with excavation works started, demolition of internal areas that will become the stadium space and construction of benches in the stadium area. The relocation of the tennis club has freed up space for the recreation centre expansion to take place. Eight new synthetic grass courts were installed at Caloola Reserve as the new home of the expanded Oakleigh Tennis Club (formed as a result of a merger between the Oakleigh and the North Oakleigh Tennis Clubs).

The outdoor pool and facilities at ORC will reopen for the 2019/20 summer season from 6 November 2019. However, there will be changes to on-site parking as space is limited whilst the redevelopment is taking place. Wayfinding signage will be installed to help people access the aquatic facilities during construction.

The redevelopment will transform the existing centre into an outstanding integrated multipurpose sports precinct, featuring:

- » Five new indoor basketball courts (also catering for netball and volleyball)
- » Improved gym and group fitness areas
- » Conversion of the existing stadium to a regional gymnastics facility for the Waverley Gymnastics Club.

Construction is expected to be completed by October 2020.

CLEAN UP in Clayton

Monash Council has been actively working with the residents of Clayton in the areas surrounding Monash University to improve waste and recycling practices. This has been in response to residents' concerns about the perception of safety in the area and general amenity issues.

In Clayton, illegally dumped waste across nature strips and footpaths, litter strewn across private and public land, overflowing bins or bins left out on nature strips for weeks is becoming more common and contributing to residents' concerns.

Council's Sustainability Team has collaborated with Monash University's Sustainability Team on the Clayton Zone Project, to improve waste and recycling, reduce illegally dumped waste and improve bin use.

This project began with funding from Sustainability Victoria's Litter Innovation Fund, which funded a student hard waste collection. Council has employed two Monash University students, who have been inspecting and auditing properties collecting data relating to litter, illegally dumped waste and kerbside collection issues. This data has been used for an education program which includes information cards placed underneath residents' doors along with tags placed on the handle of bins containing incorrect items. Council is also working closely with residents whose bins remain out after collection as Local Law number 3 requires bins to be returned to the property after collection.

Council will continue to work with residents on the correct way to reduce household waste and increase their recycling, along with returning bins to their properties after collection. The next phase includes further education and working with properties.

Council will be issuing warnings and infringements to residents in the areas surrounding Monash University who continue to do the wrong thing.
